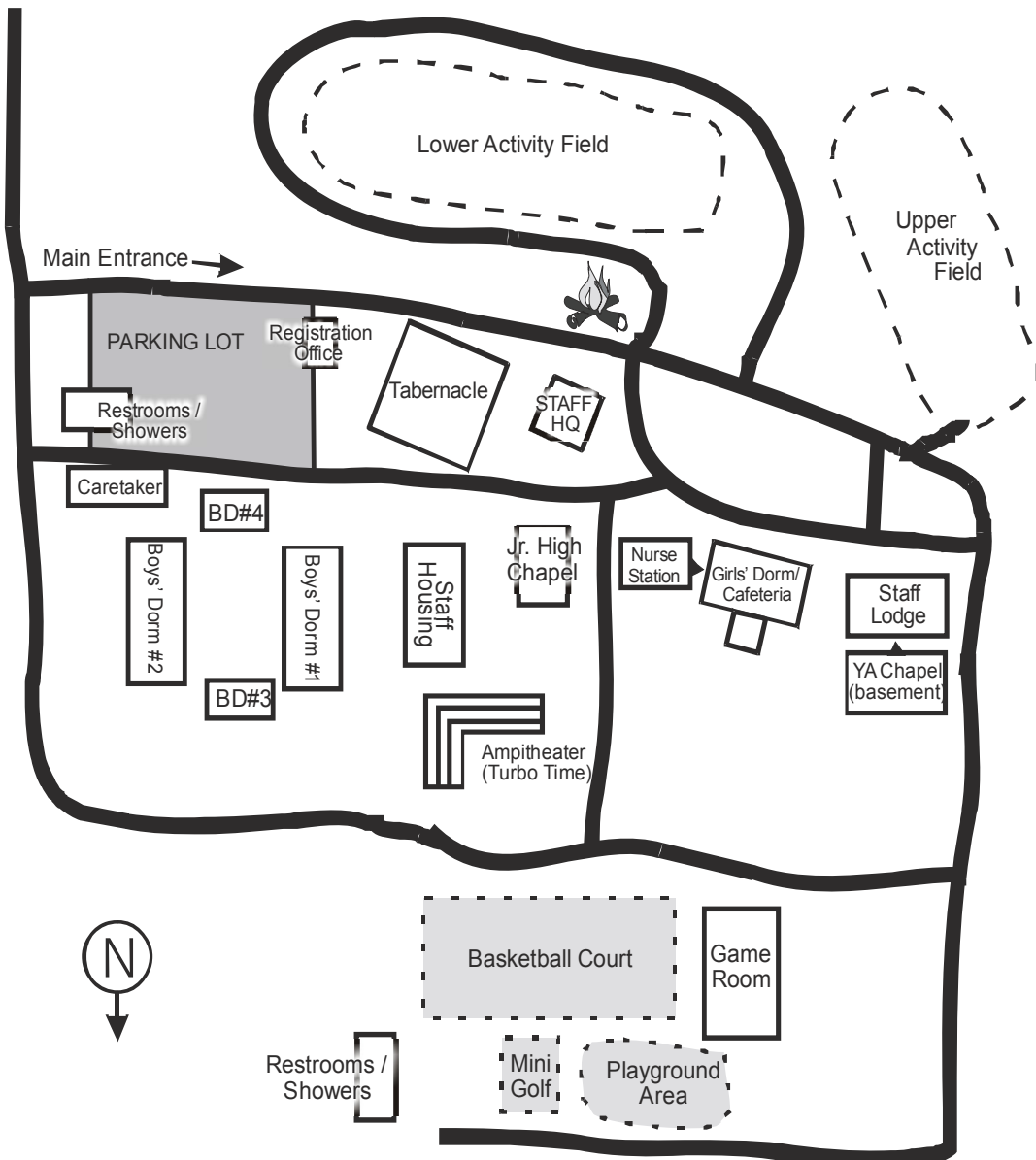

# The Role of Camp FUEGO Cabin Leaders

The primary role of the Cabin Leader at Camp FUEGO is to develop a personal relationship with each of the campers that are assigned to your cabin & to minister to them with enthusiasm, creativity and grace. Your commitment to this role is what will make this camp successful.

Everyone who has been a Cabin Leader before will tell you that planning is the key to being a great Cabin Leader, but what about the things you didn't or couldn't plan for? Such as the different personalities and backgrounds of the campers in your cabin, a camper that doesn't immediately respond well to you, sleepless nights due to conflict or ministry needs, not to mention thousands of other things beyond your control? Planning is very important, but it is only half the key. The other half is preparing. There is a big difference! **PREPARE YOURSELF FOR MINISTRY**, spiritually, emotionally and physically. You can prepare yourself for this week by using your five senses:

**There is no substitute for common sense.** Use your head, trust your heart and don't be afraid to ask for help. Common sense is the #1 prerequisite for success. The most sensible thing you can do is to rely on the Head Cabin Leaders (Jesse & Kylie Barnes) when you don't know what to do.

**Be sure that you have a sense of purpose.** Sound obvious? You would be surprised how easy it is to lose your vision in the midst of battle. Remember that you are here because God has placed you here to serve Him.

**Let your sense of adventure surface.** Cabin Leading involves a fair amount of the unknown. You could work yourself into a frenzy of anxiety from start to finish. A degree of excitement is part of the week. It is safe to trust God.

**Your sense of humor will probably be challenged more than anything else.** This is especially true if you happen to be in a cabin with younger campers. There may be little to laugh about at times, but we recommend you try it over crying. You most likely will not see the finished product this side of heaven, but you do have an opportunity to lay a strong foundation that can be built upon later.

**Seasoned Cabin Leaders will tell you that a sense of direction is critical.** The importance of knowing what direction in which you're going should never be underestimated. Nobody enjoys being lost. It wastes a lot of time and it's terribly frustrating. Spend time in prayer and in the Word, and then review the camp objectives and your own personal goals periodically. Pray for your campers, the camp speaker, camp staff and other Cabin Leaders.

## The Responsibilities of FUEGO Cabin Leaders

- Build a relationship with each of the campers in your cabin.
  - Learn their names immediately
  - Become their friend
  - Find out if they are saved and/or baptized in the Holy Spirit
  - Be sensitive to and aware of any problems that they might have
- Know where your campers are at all times and be mindful of the other campers.
- Make sure that any campers with medication turn it into the Camp Nurse as soon as possible.
- Participate in and lead all team games and activities.
- Oversee your assigned activities during free time.
- Lead daily Cabin Times.
- Enforce the "lights out" policy with authority.
- Set a good example. (Understand that young people are watching you.)
- Respect and obey camp authority and all camp rules. (Understand that young people are watching you.)

- Stop any pranks and practical jokes or any talk of pranks and practical jokes.
- Refer all discipline issues to the Head Cabin Leader. (Jesse Barnes for the guys, Kylie Barnes for the girls) It is not your responsibility to ever discipline a camper without first talking with the Head Cabin Leader.
- Report all “major” issues to the Head Cabin Leader as soon as you become aware of them. “Major” issues include, but are not limited to the following:
  - Admitted abuse of any kind
  - Drug/alcohol addiction
  - Bed wetting (seriously)
  - Violence of any kind
  - Pregnancy/Abortion
  - Anything you think they might want/need to know (better safe than sorry)
- Minister as you feel led during any post service ministry times. If you have a particular burden to minister to someone after the primary ministry time is over submit it to the Head Cabin Leader and allow him to make the call (your cabin has to be your first priority). **Cabin Leaders are to refrain from ministering in personal prophecy without a Youth Pastor present.**

### **Cabin Assignments**

Upon arriving at camp your Youth Pastor / Leader received your cabin assignment and a list of the kids who will be in your cabin. It is important for you to get to know the young people that are in your cabin as soon as possible. You will have kids from various churches in your cabin. You may or may not have any kids from your own church. Our intention is to put at least one camper from your church in your cabin, however, this may not always be an option. The cabin assignments are all pre-arranged and are not optional. Please do not attempt to move or rearrange any of the assignments.

### **The Schedule**

Each Cabin Leader is responsible for having his or her cabin to each event on time. Please be advised that there are repercussions when/if you and/or your campers are late to a scheduled event (i.e. meals, services, activities, etc.). The only way that we are able to effectively monitor the whereabouts of our campers is by your direct oversight.

#### ***Special Note***

***It is very important that each Cabin Leader attend the “Cabin Leader Meeting and Prayer” held each morning at 8:00 AM at the Staff HQ. This meeting is very important for the sanity of the Cabin Leader and for the wellbeing of camp events. At this meeting you will be receiving special instructions regarding each day’s events.***

### **Participation**

“Everybody does Everything” is the guideline for camp success. “Everything” means the scheduled activities such as meals, services, Turbo Time, team activities, - Everything! **Your example and participation in this is crucial to our ability to enforce it with our campers. Please be a good sport and take a lot of initiative in this camp aspect.**

### **Team Captains**

As a Cabin Leader, you will be assigned to a team that is composed of a mix of all campers. Your role on the team is to be the Team Captain. Each team will have multiple Captains.

The team competitions of the camp can be very instrumental in breaking down relational barriers and helping the campers to bond in fighting for a common cause. However, this is only productive if you, as the Team Captain, can maintain a good attitude and set an example of good sportsmanship. **Compete with all your heart, but remember that winning is just one of the goals - not the ultimate goal.**

## **Free-Time**

There is a substantial amount of free-time scheduled for each day of camp. During free-time the campers are encouraged to:

- Stay at the camp and play in the 3 on 3 basketball tourneys, 5 on 5 volleyball tourneys, hang out, have fun and get to know each other. The camp facility snack shop (candy, pop, etc.) is also open during the afternoon free-time and is equipped with a pool table, ping pong table, and 2 carpet ball tables.
- Ride a bus to one of the many activities outside of camp. These activities include lake activities (boating, swimming, etc.) going to the maze, riding go-carts, or hiking.

Each day we will ask Cabin Leaders to volunteer to go to one of the outside camp activities or stay back at the camp. For those that go to outside activities, they will be responsible to ensure all campers that leave camp return with the group, that the group is well behaved, and that all campers represent Christ while away for camp. Those that stay at the camp will help patrol the campsite's different areas listed below:

1. The area behind the cafeteria including the Turbo Time Area
2. Girls' Dormitory / Cafeteria
3. The Upper Activity Field
4. The Lower Activity Field
5. The Tabernacle, Staff HQ, and Jr. High Chapel
6. Basketball, Volleyball, and Playground Area
7. Boys' Dormitories

**The supervision of campers during free-time is a big job that requires all Cabin Leaders to keep a watchful eye. Campers are only allowed back to their cabins to get money and/or change their clothes. At no time during the day are campers allowed to sleep or just to "hang out" in their cabins.**

## **Dress Code**

Appropriate attire *must* be worn by *everyone* at all times. This means that all swim wear, recreational clothing and all other attire must be in good taste and modest - meaning that body parts for "your eyes only" are covered up!. If you have a question about whether or not something is appropriate, please ask a Youth Pastor or the Head Cabin Leader.

Things to watch for:

- 1) ultra tight clothing
- 2) ultra short shorts
- 3) bare midsections
- 4) bare-chested boys (or girls, for that matter)
- 5) 2 piece swimming suits on girls (or boys, for that matter)
- 6) clothing with profanity, innuendos, double entendres, rebellious slang, mullet references, or Clay Aiken song lyrics

## **Cabin Time**

On Sunday night and then each day after lunch there is a scheduled Cabin Time. This time is for you to minister individually to your cabin and talk about the ministry that they are experiencing during the evening service or daily workshops. Your Cabin Time should take approximately 30 minutes. This time is for you and your cabin only. Every camper needs to be in their assigned cabin for Cabin Time. Prepare in advance for some of your Cabin Time discussion. Ask the Lord to guide you in your planning (plan to make your Cabin Time as meaningful and memorable as possible).

Cabin Time devotionals are included in this manual and in each camper's manual also.

## **Bed Time and Lights Out**

Each night our activities will end at approximately 11:30 PM. You and your cabin are given 30 minutes to be ready for bed. This is not free time and the noise volume must be controlled. By 12:00 AM you should have all of your campers in their beds. Lights Out is at 12:00 AM and will be strictly enforced by the camp staff. There are no exceptions to the Lights Out time.

### ***Special Note:***

***If you have a camper(s) that need to take medication before going to bed, please remember to tell a staff person in your area during the Ready for Bed/Lights Out time. They will assist you in getting the medication to your camper.***

## **Pranks**

There are to be no pranks at any time during the entire week of camp. This is for the safety and well being of everyone. If you are not sure what constitutes a prank please ask your Youth Pastor or Youth Group Leader or a Camp Staff person.

## **Boyfriends and Girlfriends (Campers and Cabin Leaders)**

**Boys are blue. Girls are red. NO PURPLE!**

Camp FUEGO is not a place for the establishment or development of dating relationships. Therefore we will not allow boyfriend/girlfriend relationships (i.e. - a boy and girl spending time together to the exclusion of others). Although there will be some dating relationships that were established before arriving at camp, any physical display of affection or private one-on-one exclusive times while at the camp is not acceptable. If you notice a camper(s) that is not following this guideline please notify a Youth Pastor or the Head Cabin Leader.

## **Discipline**

Cabin Leaders should be able to discern what requires discipline and what does not. Keep in mind that we want the kids to have fun. Judgment should be exercised, always keeping in mind the overall objectives of the camp. It is intended that Cabin Leaders be available for guidance, correction, wholesome examples and encouragement, not be the "bad guy" in discipline. Don't hesitate to involve the Head Cabin Leader if something that you are not sure about comes up. If, after involving the Head Cabin Leader, the issue is not resolved, the camper's Youth Pastor/Youth Group Leader will be brought in to assist.

## **Personal Effects**

Valuables should be discreetly stored, and anything of considerable value should be locked in vehicles or left with the office.

\* NO \* stereos, CD players, mp3 players, hand held video games, TV's, pagers, cell phones or any electronic equipment will be allowed at the camp at any time. These items brought to camp will be confiscated and given to your Youth Pastor/Youth Group Leader until departure from camp.

## **Personal Medications**

All camper and Cabin Leader medications brought to camp are to be checked in at the Camp Nurse's office when first checking into camp. This includes doctor prescribed medicines and all miscellaneous over-the-counter medicines such as aspirin, hay fever pills, etc. All medications will be readily available to campers as needed and can only be administered by the Camp Nurse. Professional diligence will be administered for all prescription medication in accordance to the labeling.

Any medication found during the course of the camp is to be confiscated and turned into the Camp Nurse.

Camp staff, Cabin Leaders, and other participants are to notify the Camp Nurse of medication being used at time of arrival.

## **Vehicles**

All vehicles are to be parked in the designated area to the east of the Tabernacle and Registration office.

## **Lost and Found**

Lost and Found is located at the Snack Shack, and the Camp Administrator will be handling items that are brought in. All items left behind after Camp FUEGO will be given away or disposed of.

## **Accidents, Illnesses and Emergencies**

All illnesses and injuries of any magnitude must be reported to the Camp Nurse and Camp Director. First aid and immediate medical attention should only be administered by those that are trained and certified. First aid should be administered by those of the same gender (women to girls, and men to boys).

## **Visitor Policy**

As a general rule visitors are not allowed at Camp FUEGO. If you have a question regarding this please ask your Youth Pastor.

## **Remaining-In-Camp Policy**

Campers and/or Cabin Leaders are not allowed outside of the camp property, except for medical emergencies, or to participate in outside activities. Campers outside of the camp property must always be accompanied by a staff member. Cabin Leaders are not to take any camper outside of the camp property for any reason at any time.

## **Usher Schedule**

The purpose of the Usher Ministry is to facilitate a distraction-free environment during the evening sessions. We want our campers to be able to focus on the messages and the ministry. We also want our Cabin Leaders to be able to receive from the messages and as well as minister to our campers during the ministry time. Cabin Leaders are not responsible for keeping track of the campers if/when they leave the chapel or watching them during the service.

The ushers will be assigned one of two positions:

### **1. Door**

There are three doors in the chapel – one main entrance, one to the left and one to the right of the stage. No one will be allowed to leave the chapel during service by the side doors. Kids will not be allowed to leave the chapel during worship to “cool off.” They may use the main entrance to go to the bathroom or get a drink of water. No more than three people will be allowed to go the bathroom at a time. No more than five kids may be at the water cooler at a time.

### **2. Floor**

The floor ushers are responsible for dealing with kids who are being distracting during the service. During the ministry time they will stop any “camper to camper” ministry unless the Camp Speaker specifically initiates it. They will also take kids next door to Young Adults Chapel for special ministry needs as needed.

Your service as an usher takes priority over your personal worship or your focus on the message. You must get permission from the Worship Service Coordinators (Josh & Jessica Yakos) in order to personally minister to a camper.

Cabin Time #1 – SUNDAY, June 24<sup>th</sup>

## 1 Thessalonians 2:8 (NIV)

*“We loved you so much that we **were delighted to share with you** not only the gospel of God but **our lives** as well, because you had become so dear to us.”*

- 1) What is your name, age, and the school you attend?
  
- 2) Would you rather lose your sight or your left leg?
  
- 3) Would you rather walk 1 mile to go to work or 10 miles to go to a concert?
  
- 4) Would you rather marry a person that was 4' tall or 8' tall?
  
- 5) Would you rather have a head that is twice the normal size or half the normal size?
  
- 6) Would you rather faucet-drool constantly or finish every sentence with a “pirate-like-aaarrgh”?
  
- 7) Tell us about at least one of the following:
  - a. The worst thing you've ever cooked.
  - b. The biggest thing you've ever killed.
  - c. The stupidest thing you've ever done.
  
- 8) Tell us at least one of the following:
  - a. Your biggest pet peeve.
  - b. Your worst fear.
  - c. Your most impressive achievement.
  
- 9) Throughout the week we're going to be discussing some things that are a bit more deep and meaningful than the questions above. We're hoping to be able to help each other grow in God. How do you feel about this?
  - a. “Wow! Am I in Heaven!?! I've never been so filled with joy! I did expect more gold.”
  - b. “I am eager for a chance to mature! By the way, may I have more broccoli, please?”
  - c. “That's kind of like wearing new underwear; good - but not too comfortable.”
  - d. “I'm not into new underwear. I might give it a shot.”
  - e. “I'd rather be kicked in the head – repeatedly.”

# Cabin Time Devotions

Cabin Time #2 – MONDAY, June 25<sup>th</sup>

**Colossians 2:8 (NLT)**

***Don't let anyone lead you astray with empty philosophy and high-sounding nonsense that come from human thinking and from the evil powers of this world, and not from Christ.***

**John 4:24 (NLT)**

***"God is Spirit, so those who worship him must worship in spirit and in truth."***

This second verse sounds pretty strong; "We MUST worship Him in spirit and in truth".

Here's the bottom line: there is a right way and there is a wrong way. We must worship God in spirit and in truth. But what does that mean?

Here's a really basic description;

"In Spirit" means that God makes it possible and it's got to be in our hearts.

"In Truth" means that we have to do it His way and He does have rules for how we worship Him. This doesn't mean that God is ticked off if we sing to him with a certain style of music – but that there are patterns and principles that He chooses for how we should think of Him and approach Him.

Our theme verse for camp this year is from Colossians 2. In his letter to the Christians of Colosse, Paul is warning them about lies that are starting to screw up their understanding of God and how they worshiped Him. Some really smart-sounding people had come in and told them a bunch of stuff that just wasn't true and it was affecting the way that the Colossian people were relating to God. It changed their relationship with Him.

**Let's discuss this:**

- 1) A popular idea in our culture is that people need to do "what's right for them". Does this apply for worshipping God? If so, how? If not, why not?**
  
- 2) Would you be willing to admit that something you believe or do is simply not true? What would it take to convince you?**
  
- 3) How does it make you feel / what does it make you think when you realize that believing a lie can mess up our relationship with God? What would your response be to someone intentionally trying to mess up your walk with God?**

Did you know that God promised to write his truth on our hearts? That truth goes right along with the sermon you'll hear tonight!

# Cabin Time Devotions

Cabin Time #3 – TUESDAY, June 26<sup>th</sup>

**Ephesians 6:13-17 (NLT)**

***Use every piece of God's armor to resist the enemy in the time of evil, so that after the battle you will still be standing firm. [14] Stand your ground, putting on the sturdy BELT OF TRUTH and the body armor of God's righteousness. [15] For shoes, put on the peace that comes from the Good News, so that you will be fully prepared. [16] In every battle you will need faith as your shield to stop the fiery arrows aimed at you by Satan. [17] Put on salvation as your helmet, and take the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God.***

In a suit of ancient armor, the belt was more than something that simply held up your pants, or acted as a nice accessory to a coordinating outfit. The belt was more like a harness with a bunch of straps that hooked in various places on the guy's body. All the other armor was hooked to this harness and was supported by it. If a soldier didn't have his belt, his armor was pretty much useless.

This is a great way to think of truth. If it is impure or inaccurate, it's like the belt is cut or missing and our entire "suit of armor" is out of whack.

If you don't know the true way to know God, you'll never meet Him.

If you don't know the true blessings of the cross, you won't live right (righteously).

If you don't know the truth about your future and identity, you won't have peace even in good times – let alone when times are tough.

If you don't know the true nature of our loving and generous God, you won't trust and believe Him for much.

To put it into modern terminology, you could say that truth is the key to your car. You could have a great car, but if you can't turn it on, it's pretty much useless.

**So now, let's discuss this:**

- 1) Have you ever found yourself in a place where someone asked you a question about your beliefs and you didn't know the answer? How did you feel? What did you do about it?**
  
- 2) How do you put on "the sturdy belt of truth"? And are you doing it?**
  
- 3) How can you find help to make this a reality in your life?**

Armor is made for battle. God wants us to be victorious in spiritual battle. That's part of the focus of tonight's sermon. Get ready!

# Cabin Time Devotions

Cabin Time #4 – WEDNESDAY, June 27<sup>th</sup>

**John 8:31-32 (NIV)**

***... Jesus said, "If you hold to my teaching, you are really my disciples. [32] Then you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free."***

A lot of people mess this verse up. They focus only on the second part so they think that if you just study a lot or memorize some Bible passages that you'll do just fine staying out of the junk of this world. That's not true. Studying the Bible is crucial but it is **DOING** that makes the difference. For a clue about what "hold to my teaching" means, look at this same scripture in the New Living Translation:

**John 8:31-32 (NLT)**

***Jesus said to the people who believed in him, "You are truly my disciples if you keep obeying my teachings. [32] And you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free."***

It's not enough to just know the truth. You've got to live it out to see the blessings of God in your life. Believing isn't enough, either. The Bible says that the demons of hell believe in God and fear Him (James 2:19). They're not saved and going onto great things in God, are they? No. Because they don't obey His teaching.

As we finish up our last couple days of camp, you have to get this in your heart. If your life is going to be different at home, it's going to happen by knowing the truth. You're going to really know the truth when you follow God obediently. Simply say, "Yes" more than you say, "No". And if you say, "No" – admit that you're wrong and start fresh with the forgiveness of God.
